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

The British Virgin Islands (BVI) is the ideal destination for a romantic retreat.

This stunning sixty-island archipelago provides a plethora of activities for those seeking adventure or spaces for those searching for a quiet retreat for rejuvenation and revival.

he islands are little green gems, with sizes ranging from Tortola at 21 square miles to Sandy Cay which is less than half an acre. Sixteen of these islands are inhabited, and most of the islands' over 30,000 residents live on Tortola, Virgin Gorda, Anegada and Jost Van Dyke.

As the custodians of some of the BVI's most celebrated natural treasures, The BVI National Parks Trust manages twenty-one national parks, protecting unique areas in the territory comprising natural habitats for plants and animals, thus preserving the islands' wildlife.

The continued preservation of these habitats ensures that their unique existing life forms continue to thrive and are preserved for present and future generations to enjoy. The unique features of these islands continue to attract visitors who come to enjoy their natural beauty.

The islands' environment of verdant vegetation, unique topography and seas teeming with ocean creatures provides a dream destination for those seeking sun, sea and sand, making the islands an ideal destination for vacationing.

The preservation of these unique features

is the impetus for the development of resorts which preserve the natural environment while providing romantic retreats for the environmentally conscious and also attracting newlyweds seeking romantic and idyllic honeymoon retreats.

With its pristine beaches, turquoise waters, and idyllic resorts, the BVI offers the perfect location for couples to deepen their relationships and create memories to be shared over a lifetime.

Tortola, the largest island is home to its capital city, Road Town. The capital is home to the main government offices and commercial activity. Virgin Gorda, the next largest island is considered the playground for tourism activity. Although only eight square miles, the island throbs with activity during the tourism season from November to April.

The first-class resorts on the island provide environments where couples can find rest, in addition to first-class restaurants on the island and neighbouring islands. There are several scenic beaches, most famous is the Baths National Park. Virgin Gorda is the perfect destination for sailing, swimming, snorkelling, and diving.

If you are a local, who is planning your dream wedding, what is a better way than to actually follow our popular sayings; "I live where you vacation." This statement can turn into "I live where you vacation, and I'm going to make it my destination wedding."

MARRIAGE RULES AND REGULATIONS

Upon arrival in the Virgin Islands, you can apply for a Marriage Licence at the Registrar General's Office. It is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

A marriage licence takes one (1) working day to process. Once the Government has granted a licence, it remains valid for three (3) months from the date it is signed.

At the Registrar General's Office, you will be required:

- To present a US\$340 postage stamp (purchased from the Registrar General's Office or Post Office) for a Special Licence.
 To qualify for a special licence, you must be present at the time of application and plan to be a resident/present in the Virgin Islands for at least one day.
- To present US\$120 postage stamp (purchased from the Registrar General's

Office or Post Office) for an Ordinary Licence, if you have been resident in the Virgin Islands for 15 days or more.

- To show proof of your identity and your resident status i.e. the day you arrived in the Virgin Islands (via your passport).
- To show proof of your marital status (including certified copies of Decree(s) Absolute for divorced spouse or Death Certificate(s) of deceased spouse).
- To have two persons to witness (and to sign) your application for the licence. Please note that these two witnesses need not be the same two witnesses who are present at your Marriage Ceremony.
- Please note that you can always request persons in the Virgin Islands to be witnesses at the Registrar General's Office and at your Marriage Ceremony.

Having applied for the licence, you should then schedule an appointment for the date and time you propose to be married. If you

have telephoned your appointment from abroad, you will need to confirm it at the Registrar General's Office at this time.

Ceremonies Performed by the Registrar General

Weddings are performed by the Registrar General outside the Office between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 6:30 p.m., Monday through Saturday and inside the Office between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday to Friday.

In the event of any 'acts of God' whether it be heavy rain, storms or earthquakes, the Registrar General or Marriage Officer reserves the right to postpone the wedding to a more convenient time agreed by both parties.

At the Registrar General's Office, you will be required to complete an application form showing your names as shown on your travel documents, ages, occupations, marital status, and the names of two witnesses (these two witnesses must be present at the Ceremony). Please be careful to accurately spell the names of the witnesses. Any correction of an error will attract a charge of US\$15. You must also then indicate the proposed venue for the marriage ceremony.

If you wish to be married at the Registrar General's Office, you will be required to pay a fee of US\$340. If you wish the Registrar General to perform your wedding ceremony outside the office, the fee is US\$220. All cheques should be made payable to the Accountant General. If the Registrar General is required to go to one of the adjoining islands of the Virgin Islands, for instance Jost Van Dyke, Virgin Gorda, Peter Island, Guana Island, Salt Island, Anegada, Norman Island etc., you will be required to pay the Registrar General's transportation to that Island.

If you wish to be married in the church of your choice, wedding banns must be published on three (3) consecutive Saturdays or Sundays in that church. You must make arrangements with the Minister of the church in advance. You can also be married in a church by Special Marriage Licence, but those arrangements will also have to be made with a church Minister.

It would be wise to travel with your driver's licence or birth certificate in addition to your essential travel documents, i.e. your passports. In addition, all documents showing your marital status should be originals or certified as true copies of the original.

Our marriage certificates with the Registrar General's seal are official legal documents and the first marriage certificate is free once the Registrar General performs the wedding ceremony. You may, however, wish to check with your local authorities in the event that the certificate requires to be legally authenticated by means of an apostille. If apostilles are required, these can also be prepared at the Registrar General's Office on payment of US\$40.






Good Food, Good Music and good company. Then just enjoy it. Don't let small details get to you. As long as you are enjoying it that is what matters – it really is the best day of your life.

L&S: What inspired you to choose this career path?


I grew up in a family where I am surrounded by bakers. From my grandmother, aunts, greataunt and cousins. It also allows me to express myself artistically.



To provide comfort and financial stability for his family, Danley, like many others, along with his wife left the Virgin Islands to seek employment on St. John, USVI at Caneel Bay Hotel, where he worked for many years. As the family grew, after the birth of their second child, the Rhymers made a life-changing decision to return to Tortola, to the comfort of close family and friends. A decision that they have never regretted despite the challenges faced. Family was more important that making money.

The Rhymers both agree that they are each other's best friend. They spend lots of time together, enjoy each other's company and enjoy having a good laughter together. The foundation that their relationship is built on is the relationship they have with God and

praying together daily. Love exudes them, as they are often seen holding hands.

Ethlyn shared how her faith in God has and continues to be the pillar or glue that keeps their relationship together. She further stated, "At a very young age I was led to faith by women at a revival service at the Cane



Garden Bay Methodist Church and it changed my life completely. My faith in God has given me the strength to cope and endure all the tests and trials that have come over these 50 years of marriage. Without Him, it would have been humanly impossible. I have learned that God is interested in every area of my life, including my marriage."

The love birds continue to count their many blessings. They have achieved many successes in life but their family tops them all. The love and support of three loving children, one devoted son-in-law and one brilliant grandson. "Over the past five years this family has been severely tested but we have stuck together and continue to realise that Family Matters", said Danley.

As we wrap up our discussion on their 50 year journey, Ethlyn share her top three for building a strong, everlasting marriage: "cherish each other-don't take each other for granted; have fun together-don't focus on whether the toothpaste is squeezed right or how many times the toilet lid is up or down; and Pray together.

She also shared the below experience that has become an enjoyable memory for them to share with family and friends, and also acts as reminder that brings focus to their strong







union. "Danley and I lived in our own home, but his parents' home was not too far away. Soon after our marriage I remember I had prepared a meal out of a Caribbean recipe book and was waiting for my husband to come home to enjoy it. To my surprise my husband said he had already eaten by his mother. My emotions took over. I was disappointed and angry. Didn't he realise that we were now married, and his meals were to be prepared by me? I fussed and cried although he kept saying he would eat it later. To me the damage was done, and he couldn't fix it. However, as I recall, we made up and it didn't make a wedge between us nor his mom and me. She was the best mother-in-law anyone could have. I

have reminded him of this memory from time to time as something to laugh about."

The couple recommends that "before marriage, take the time to get to know each other and we don't mean sexually. Find out each other's hopes and dreams; the core values that govern each other's lives; what drives him/her; is he/she a nice, kind person or displaying signs of selfishness. Check how he/she treat their parents and friends.

Living with someone to determine if you're compatible for marriage is unadvisable. Love someone for who they are and not for what they have. Having lots of money is not guaranteed to hold a marriage together. Do not enter into a marriage if you're already

planning an escape route if things turn sour. Do not enter into a marriage if you are unwilling to give up all your old love relationships. Get to know Almighty God in a personal relationship. He can sustain you through your marriage."

Photos of Ethlyn and Danley broke Facebook a few weeks ago when family shared an incredible 50th anniversary photo shoot and photos of surprise intimate celebration with close family and friends. They are both retired and currently share time with their close net family in the mainland USA and here at home. They look forward to enjoying many more anniversaries granted to them by God

In the sparkling sapphire waters of the British Virgin Islands, there is a captivating archipelago known as The Indians. The Indians stand as one of the most popular dive site in the British Virgin Islands, second only to the legendary wreck of the RMS Rhone. It stands out with its four majestic pinnacles rising dramatically from the ocean floor.

his enchanting place is not only a visual spectacle but also one of the best snorkeling and diving spots in the entire

Just half a mile north of Norman Island, the beauty of The Indians from top to bottom, is breath-taking. Above the water, these rocky formations are a sight to behold from its 50-foot sandy bottom. From a distance, these

four rocky pinnacles are said to resemble a Native American chief's headdress, earning them their name.

The Indians offers an alluring appeal to snorkelers. The shallower side of the rocks serves as a popular snorkeling spot, offering mooring opportunities for boats seeking refuge in the shelter of Pelican Island. The crystal blue depths of The Indians are ideal, providing an opportunity to swim amongst a

vibrant dance of blue chromis, creole wrasse, angel fish, jelly fish, and numerous other colorful fish and marine wildlife. With four-day moorings available on the west side of the rocks, visitors have the chance to immerse themselves in the vibrant underwater world; however, caution is necessary, as surface currents in the area demand attention.

It is also a perfect diving spot. Here, corals and gorgonians paint the rocky formations, creating a stunning display. Nestled among the pinnacles are a small tunnel and a cave, creating unique underwater features that divers can't resist exploring. The lavish corals and sponges add a burst of color, contrasting against the rocky ledges and steep walls that reach towards the surface.

It is one of those sites with many passageways, that will leave you yearning to wonder what is around the next corner. A large cave, filled with Glassy Sweepers, awaits on the east side of the rocks. Its crystal-clear waters are also host to a kaleidoscope of other marine life, with vibrant coral reefs beckoning divers in, with its array of colors. From parrotfish to angelfish, and even clownfish, the region's tropical fish species mesmerize divers. Sea turtles including hawksbills and graceful rays add to the allure, creating unforgettable encounters beneath the waves. A saddle between two of the pinnacles allows access to a broad, shallow pool, serving as an invitation to divers to follow the arched swim-throughs that eventually will lead them back to where they began.

As the sun streaks its rays across the swells, it creates mesmerizing photo opportunities that can hardly be resisted. The Indians are not simply admired for their natural beauty. They also hold historical significance, inspiring the classic novel Treasure Island by Robert Louis Stevenson. These caves and the surrounding marine life found within their depths leave a lasting impression on sailors and storytellers alike. The wrecks of old ships, now vibrant artificial reefs, embrace a diversity of marine life, showcasing the historical legacy of the British Virgin Islands.

While the dive and snorkeling sites of The



Indians are popular, they are also carefully protected. The BVI National Parks Trust installs over 120 moorings throughout the area, ensuring the fragile ecosystem remains preserved. Preserving the reefs and pristine marine environment is a priority in the British Virgin Islands. The fragility of the reefs is a reminder of the impact of pollution, and efforts are made to educate visitors about the harmful effects of plastic and chemical-laden sunscreens. Respect for the underwater world is paramount. We urge that you consider preparations to dive carefully to protect yourself and protect your diving

environment, so that it will be sustainable for

many years to come.

When exploring the underwater wonders of the British Virgin Islands, it is important to consider the best time to dive. The dry season, from December to May, offers clearer skies and minimal rainfall, providing optimal underwater visibility and safer diving conditions. During these months, calm seas facilitate smooth boat travel to diving sites, while warm water temperatures welcome divers without the need for thick wetsuits. Arrange with a local dive center to explore this underwater adventure who will advise you on what would be required to enjoy an unforgettable afternoon with the Indians.

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

Learn the numbers to know to ensure a healthy heart for life

Then, you must contend with that pesky chocolate holiday in February.

ertain routine tests provide valuable information about your health outlook and help you know how to best care for your heart: blood pressure, cholesterol level, and waist circumference.

Blood pressure

Your blood pressure measures the force of blood pressing against the arteries as your heart pumps blood. It is represented by two numbers, the systolic and diastolic. Your systolic pressure is the measurement of pressure while your heart is pumping blood, and diastolic pressure refers to your heart's pressure at rest.

A normal blood pressure reading is a systolic (top) number under 120 mmHg and a diastolic (bottom) number under 80 mmHg. Prehypertension — a condition of elevated risk for high blood pressure — refers to blood pressure readings between 120-139 (systolic) and 80-89 (diastolic).

Prehypertension can be managed with diet, exercise and medication, but can also advance to full-blown hypertension: 140-59 over 90-99 mmHg.

According to the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, about one in three U.S. adults have high blood pressure. And, because high blood pressure has no symptoms, many people have the condition for years without knowing it. That's why it's important to know your blood pressure so that you can make appropriate lifestyle choices and, if necessary, begin treating the condition with medication. Left untreated, high blood pressure can damage your heart, blood vessels, kidneys and other organs. It can lead to coronary artery disease, heart failure, stroke, kidney failure, and other serious health conditions.

Blood pressure also rises with age. Men over age 45 and women over age 55 have an increased risk of hypertension. Other factors, such as your ethnic background, a family history of high blood pressure, or being

overweight or obese, can elevate your risk. There are other risks for high blood pressure that you can control, such as avoiding high-sodium foods, smoking, excessive use of alcohol, and getting regular exercise.

Cholesterol level

Keeping the heart and blood healthy go hand-in-hand — the level of cholesterol in the blood is a major factor in your heart health. Cholesterol is a naturally occurring substance in the blood that is necessary for producing cell membranes and certain hormones, and supporting other body functions. Its bad reputation comes from the health problems that occur when there is too much cholesterol in the blood. High blood cholesterol is a primary risk factor in heart disease and stroke.

Approximately 75 percent of the cholesterol in our blood is produced in our bodies, and 25 percent from the food we eat. The amount of cholesterol your body produces is determined by your genetic background.

A blood test ordered by your doctor will measure the total blood cholesterol, low-density lipoprotein (LDL, also known as "bad" cholesterol), high-density lipoprotein (HDL, also known as "good" cholesterol), and triglycerides. A total cholesterol level of less than 200 mg/dL is desirable; 200 to 239 mg/dL is considered borderline high; and 240 mg/dL or above is considered high blood cholesterol. According to the AHA, a total cholesterol of 240 mg/dL and up more than doubles the risk of heart disease.

In addition to your total cholesterol score, it's important to know how your numbers add up. A high HDL number – above 60 mg/dL – is considered ideal, as this protects against heart disease. An LDL cholesterol level of less than 100 mg/dL is optimal, but levels of 100-129 mg/dL are also acceptable. The ideal LDL score varies from person to person, depending on your genetic background and other risk factors for heart disease or diabetes. In recent years, physicians have discovered that in patients with existing coronary artery disease, an LDL number below 70 will reduce the risk of progression of disease.

The American Heart Association recommends that all adults age 20 and over have a cholesterol test at least every five years. Your physician may test your cholesterol more frequently if you have high cholesterol or risk factors.

Waist size

A slender waist is not just a matter of looking good, but also maintaining good health. Numerous studies have linked waist size with heart health. People who carry fat around the waist – an "apple" shape as opposed to a "pear" shape – are more likely to develop health problems than those with extra weight in the hips and thighs, even if their body mass index falls in the "normal" range. Guidelines published by National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, in cooperation with the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Disease set a healthy waist limit of 35 inches for women and 40 inches for men.

Extra weight around the middle raises


your risk of a variety of other conditions, in addition to heart disease: diabetes, high blood pressure, stroke, cancer, sleep apnea, liver disease, gallbladder disease and osteoarthritis.

To measure your waist circumference, place a tape measure around your bare abdomen just above your hip bone. The tape should be snug (without pressing inward on the skin) and your stomach should be relaxed.

Remember that this information is not intended to replace the advice of your regular primary health provider, but rather to increase awareness and help equip patients with information to facilitate conversations with their physician.

SISTER ISLANDS









There are several major banks in the British Virgin Islands: Banco Popular de Puerto Rico, FirstBank Puerto Rico, CIBC-First Caribbean International Bank (Cayman) Limited, National Bank of the Virgin Islands (formerly Development Bank), Republic Bank (British Virgin Islands) Limited and VP Bank (BVI) Limited. Hours vary, but most are open Monday through Thursday, from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. They all have extended hours on Fridays. Banco Popular opens a teller drive-through window from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. weekdays, and 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturdays. FirstBank is open Saturdays from 9 a.m. to noon.

BUSINESS HOURS

Most businesses open at 8:30 a.m. and close at 5 p.m. Many merchant stores, including pharmacies, are closed after 1 p.m. on Saturday and all day on Sunday; but a few open if cruise ships are in port. Supermarkets open earlier and close later, and most are open on weekends and holidays. Bobby's Supermarket in Road Town is open from 7 a.m. until midnight every day. Call a specific business for its hours of operation.

The islands benefit from the trade winds that keep humidity low, but temperatures rarely go above 95 F or below 75 F. The wettest months are between September and November, coinciding with the height of the hurricane season.

CREDIT CARDS

Many BVI establishments accept credit cards, generally MasterCard or Visa; some, but not all, take American Express. There is an American Express office at Romney Associates in Road Town. There are several ATM machines on Tortola located in Road Town, Cane Garden Bay, West End and at the Terrance B. Lettsome

International Airport on Beef Island. There are no banks or ATM machines on Virgin Gorda, Anegada, Jost Van Dyke or Peter Island. Please note that there is a 10-cent stamp duty charged on all cheques, including traveller's cheques.

CURRENCY

U.S. dollar is the only legal tender in the BVI. Major credit cards are accepted in many, but not all, establishments. It's advisable to travel with U.S. traveller's cheques.

MONEY TRANSFERS

MoneyGram and Western Union provide services to receive and send money worldwide.

VISITOR REQUIREMENT

Passports are required by all. Return tickets are required for visitors and those coming on

DEPARTURE TAX

After you have checked in at the airport or at any sea-port, look for the departure tax window. Every air travel passenger must pay a \$20 departure tax in cash or by Visa or MasterCard (cheques are not accepted). For those leaving by sea, during the second half of 2013 departure tax from sea ports increased to \$20 for visitors and \$15 for residents. Cruise ship passengers pay \$7.

DIVING AND SAILING

Many diving and yachting companies specialise in helping you take advantage of BVI's excellent diving sites and the fact that it's the Sailing Capital of the World.

Recreational drugs are strictly forbidden. Their possession, sale, use or distribution is a criminal offence punishable by law. Conviction can lead to heavy fines and jail sentences.

Electricity is supplied by the BVI Electricity Corporation. The standard electrical current is 110 volts on all the islands.

Non-British Virgin Islanders need a recreational fishing permit to remove any marine organism from BVI waters. There are closed seasons for harvesting certain species of fish and other seafood. Call the Conservation and Fisheries Division at 494-5681 for information. Recreational fishing permits will be issued at all ports of entry for \$45. A licence is required for every adult on board who will be fishing.

ISLAND INFORMATION ONLINE

The BVI Tourist Board's website (bvitourism.com) offers printable online information about each island, useful schedules and much more. The BVI Chamber of Commerce & Hotel Association (BVICCHA; bvihotels.org, BVI Government, VI Life&Style magazine, Property and Yacht magazine, two local newspapers also host helpful links to other web-sites belonging to various individual hotels and organisations. You may also want to visit experiencethebvi.com for useful information about the islands.

Dr. D. Orlando Hospital is the main general hospital in Road Town, Tortola; but health clinics are available at villages on Tortola, Virgin Gorda and other sister islands. There's also a government dental clinic in the hospital in Road Town. Dr. Adamson, Smile Dental, Premier Dental, Dr. Rhymer and B&F Medical Complex, VI Medical – Manual Reef, pro-vide experienced general dental services, whilst Vision Center offers advanced eye care.

The main post office on Blackburne Highway also has a philatelic counter. There are sub post offices on Beef Island (Airport), and West End on Tortola, and on the larger sister islands. Most hotels and resorts offer daily mail pickups. Virgin Islands' stamps are worldwide collectors' items. The BVI Philatelic Society (494-7789) organises an annual stamp exhibition, usually held in the spring, that attracts a wide range of enthusiasts.

RADIO AND TELEVISION

Local radio stations, most of which are available on-line, include ZBVI (780 AM), ZKING (100.9 FM), ZROD (103.7 FM), ZCCR (94.1 FM), 100.5 Tola Radio and ZVCR (106.9 FM). Local cable channels include 1, 51, 52 and 55. Public service channels include 12 (VVCJX, St. Thomas, USVI) and 25 (BBC World). A few channels broadcast in Spanish, including Channel 4 (Azteca). News and entertainment are also available on cable channels beamed from numerous U.S. cities and satellites

Smoking in public places such as restaurants, bars, shopping malls, recreational facilities, offices, public transportation terminals, etc. is forbidden, in accordance with the Tobacco Products Control Act of the BVI. It's also forbidden to smoke within 50 feet of these public spaces A person found smoking tobacco in a public place will be subject to a fine. In the BVI, it's illegal to sell cigarettes to persons who are under 18 years old.

A 7 percent government tax is usually added to your hotel bill, as well as a 10 percent hotel service charge. Additional tipping is optional. It's customary to include a 15 percent tip when dining out. Most restaurants automatically include this on the bill as a service charge.

Air: Regional airlines connect Beef Island with international hubs (e.g., San Juan, Puerto Rico, and Antiqua) and other Carib-bean islands. Small planes fly between Beef Island and Virgin Gorda and St. Thomas, USVI. Charter planes are also available to the outer islands and the U.S. Virgin Islands from the airport on Beef Island.

Land: The British Virgin Islands have 150 roads, of which 118 are paved. The two main roads on Tortola are Blackburne Road, which runs along the seashore from the eastern to the western end of the is-land, and Ridge Road, which runs centrally over the hills. Both offer spectacular scenic views of the islands

Buses: Mini and safari bus outings are usually arranged by the hotels and are also available for other extended group trips and scenic

Car Rentals: Renting a car is both economical and convenient. There are several agencies offering reasonable rates, unlimited mileage, emergency services and additional insurance. If visiting for more than a month, a temporary licence must be obtained from the Department of Motor Vehicles in Pockwood Pond. The cost is \$10. Bring your passport and a valid driver's licence from country of origin. Driving is on the left-hand side of the road.

Ferry Services: The main ferry docks on Tortola are in Road Town and at West End. Inter-island boat services operate several times per day between Tortola and several other islands in the BVI (including Marina Cay, Scrub Island Virgin Gorda, Peter Island and Jost Van Dyke) and the USVI (St. Thomas and St. John). Ferry services to Anegada are available daily except on Saturday. Departure and arrival information can be obtained at the front desk of your hotel. **Taxis:** Taxis are available at the air-port, hotels, taxi stands and other venues throughout the islands. Some hotels have a franchised taxi arrangement for guests or will quickly order a taxi from the front desk. Taxi drivers usually provide running commentaries on local history and other useful information. New government rates are now in effect. It's a good idea to check the fare with your driver in advance.

Taxi Rates Tortola: A fare for one person from the airport to Slaney is US\$30. A chartered taxi from Road Town to any of the villages can range from \$15 to \$27 for one person depending on the distance, and the regular fare around town is \$5. Farther out to the suburbs is \$6. and the fare from Road Town to West End is \$27. From the cruise ship dock to most beaches, the range is from \$24 to \$27 for one person, but for three or more people the fare ranges from \$8 to \$12 each. Virgin Gorda: From The Valley to The Baths is \$6, and from Gun Creek to the Yacht Harbour is \$30. Anegada: From the airport to Loblolly Bay is \$7, whilst to Setting Point is \$14.

Jost Van Dyke: One person going from Great Harbour to White Bay pays \$10, and to Bubbly Pool, \$20. Three or more people going to Bubbly Pool pay \$10 each.

Tours: A one-hour tour for up to two people is

\$55 (fixed rate), whilst for up to three people the cost rises to \$70. A group of five persons is \$100 (each ad-ditional person over the five pays \$15). A two-hour tour starts at \$110 for up to two people. Waiting charges: First 15 minutes are free, but every subsequent block of 15 minutes is \$10. Tour costs are the same for all islands. Children three years or younger travel at no cost, children ages 4-10 pay half fare, and children 11 and over pay the full fare. Between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. there is a sur-charge of 30 percent on all fares. Always dis-cuss the rates with your driver in advance. There is limited bus service running

MAIN STREET RESTAURANT "BRINGING THE WORLD TO YOUR TABLE"

Initiative, creativity, and spontaneity drive the unique dishes that Main Street Restaurant brings to Road Town on a weekly basis. From oxtail tacos to seafood jambalaya, there's rarely a set menu that customers can expect, and owner Kai de Castro says it's to keep people on their toes.

he menu is designed to keep fresh ocal ingredients including catch like snapper and tuna, and also to keep it simple and easy. From lasagna to burgers, grilled steak to pizza, customers can find a variety of offerings every day of the week.

It's de Castro's perspective that's helped shape the vision for the restaurant, which opened in August. As a belonger, he studied civil engineering in Florida and traveled throughout Europe and the Caribbean to islands like St. Kitts, St. Lucia, and Dominica to see how the world worked. He came to realize that "every country has its own niche" and its own way about it.

By taking the unique qualities and traits of the Virgin Islands and mixing that with qualities found all over the world, de Castro has painstakingly built Main Street Restaurant.

When you first pass by Main Street Restaurant, it's a bit of a shock: the brightly colored orange exterior complemented by dark wooden shutters and contrasting silver hinges give way to the neatly framed sign with the restaurant's name. Notable is the old-

fashioned post office sign tucked into the logo, bearing "Q II E" for the late Queen Elizabeth II.

It's this historical touch that Kai de Castro has worked so hard to bring to fruition since he first began construction at the site in 2019-and he can pinpoint exactly what inspired him to do it

"I went to Portugal, and I Googled "the best place in town," and it was this old little vintage breakfast spot somebody's grandma opened," he said. "I went to other places like Belgium, Spain and again, it's the same feeling — they take the town, and they create an











He took his 100-year-old family property, which was built in 1920, and decided to create something that would withstand the test of time on it.

"I did it because I want to say, 'Okay, the building has been here for 100 years. I want the restaurant to be here for 100 years," he said.

Badly damaged in hurricane Irma in 2017, the process was long and took diligence. It was de Castro's five-year plan to bring "a little bit of Tortola, a little bit of the BVI, a little Caribbean" to the area.

Walking into the entrance you'll find an original post office box that used to be found throughout the Virgin Islands, something only sharp-eyed individuals will glimpse remnants of in remote corners of the island. This one's been done up — its vivid blue paint is something difficult to avoid, whether you're just strolling by or interested in a bite.

The first of four seating areas is an outdoor patio featuring a calming wall of succulents and greenery. A larger table of six can be seated there comfortably, but smaller and more intimate groups of four or two can also have tables on the patio. A fully stocked open bar also has seating for those who want a cold one and an outdoor ambience closer to the ground. Come upstairs, through the main doors, and an entirely different atmosphere opens up.

Neatly pressed brown tiles frame a well-lit bar area, where waitresses and waiters have an arrangement of spirits and exactly the right






dinnerware to serve them in. Casual music fills the area, where swivel chairs line the bar front and small tables line the walls. Home country pride and heritage are displayed on the walls with license plates, offering a slightly grunge aesthetic in an otherwise elegant environment.

Adjacently, a room filled with high leatherback booths and small tables with leather chairs gives a cozy dinner environment. Crimson red napkins holding silverware are placed at each table, popping up against the neutral brown and black furniture.

Another patio — this one overlooking the street — welcomes the sounds of historic Main Street and views of the colorful buildings around. The patio is filled with highchairs and glass tables.

Patrons come into and out of the establishment, often picking up their lunchtime meals passed through the open bar area.

Espresso Rubbed Flank Steak

Coffee and steak might seem like an unlikely partnership, but the flavor of beef is heightened by the robust flavors of java. This coffee-rubbed steak dish would be perfect with grilled vegetables and a side of raspberry compote. Make sure to let the beef rest, you don't want to cut into it too early, and all the hot juices will bleed out instead of being reabsorbed by the meat.

NUTRITION: 270 calories, 15 g fat (6 g saturated), 600 mg sodium SERVES 4

INGREDIENTS:

- 1/2 Tbsp finely ground coffee or
- 1/2 Tbsp chili powder

- Salt and black pepper to taste
- 1 lb. flank or skirt steak (Skirt and flank are among our two favorite cuts, but any steak—strip, tenderloin, ribeye—would benefit from this coffee treatment)
- Pico de Gallo
- 1 lime, quartered


INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Preheat a grill, grill pan, or cast-iron skillet
- 2. Combine the coffee grounds with the chili powder, plus a few generous pinches of salt and pepper.
- 3. Rub the spice mixture all over the steak. Cook the beef for 3 to 4 minutes per side, depending on thickness, until slightly firm but still yielding.

4. Let the steak rest for at least 5 minutes, then slice thinly against the grain of the meat. Serve with a big scoop of Pico de Gallo and a wedge of lime.

Sometimes unconventional pairings yield surprisingly tasty results. Try any of these combinations as a treat for your taste buds:

- Olive oil and ice cream, with a pinch of coarse sea salt
- Strawberries, balsamic vinegar, and black pepper
- Peanut butter, banana, and bacon between toasted bread (the King would approve of this Elvis sandwich)
- Mango, pineapple, and papaya chunks topped with lime juice and hot sauce



Easy Grilled Ratatouille Salad Recipe

NUTRITION: 270 calories, 19 g fat (2.5 g saturated), 385 mg sodium SERVES 4

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 large red onion, cut into 1/4"-thick slices
- 1 red bell pepper, quartered, stems and seeds removed
- 1 medium eggplant, cut into 1/4"-thick planks
- 1 large portobello mushroom cap, cut into 1/4"-thick slices
- 1 large zucchini, cut into 1/4"-thick planks

- 2 medium yellow squash, cut into 1/4"-thick planks
- 12–16 asparagus stalks, woody ends removed
- 4 Tbsp olive oil
- Salt and black pepper to taste
- 1 Tbsp prepared pesto
- 2 Tbsp red wine vinegar
- 2 Tbsp pine nuts, toasted
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan

INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Preheat a grill.

- 2. Toss the vegetables with 2 tablespoons olive oil and generously season with salt and pepper.
- 3. Grill the vegetables until cooked through and lightly charred, removing each individually when it has reached this stage. Some vegetables (like the onion and pepper) will take longer than others (like the asparagus and squash).
- 4. Combine the pesto and vinegar in a small bowl, then slowly drizzle in the remaining 2 tablespoons olive oil.
- 5. Cut the red pepper into thin slices, then toss all of the vegetables with the vinaigrette, pine nuts, and Parmesan.



Chili – Peach Baby Back Ribs

Pitmasters can spend 10 hours feeding their smokers to sweat out a few racks of ribs. We admire the dedication, but when it comes to home cooking, there's an easier way to make amazing ribs. It starts in the oven, where spice-rubbed ribs are slow-roasted until tender. From there they go to the grill for a concentrated blast of hickory smoke. Finish with a barbecue sauce spiked with bourbon and peach, and you have a ribs recipe any barbecue baron could respect.

NUTRITION: 410 calories, 31 g fat (11 g saturated), 460 mg sodium SERVES 6 TO 8

INGREDIENT:

- · 2 medium racks baby back ribs
- 1/2 Tbsp chili powder
- 1 Tbsp brown sugar
- · Salt and black pepper to taste

- 1/2 cup classic barbecue sauce or favorite barbecue sauce
- · 2 Tbsp bourbon (optional)
- 1 very ripe peach, peeled and pitted
- 2 cups hickory chips, soaked in water for 30 minutes

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 300°F. Rub the top sides of the ribs with the chili powder and brown sugar and season with salt and black pepper.
- 2. Place the racks on a baking sheet, cover with foil, and bake for 90 minutes, until the meat is tender but not falling completely off the bone.
- 3. While the ribs cook, combine the barbecue sauce, bourbon (if using), and peach in a food processor or blender and puree.
- 4. Preheat a grill over medium heat.

- 5. Place the chips in a wood-chip box (or in a foil packet—see "Kitchen tip" below) and place the box below the grill grate, directly over the flame. (If using charcoal, sprinkle the chips directly over the fire.)
- 6. Place the ribs on the grill, close the lid, and allow the meat to absorb the smoke for 15 to 20 minutes. Paint the ribs with a generous amount of the barbecue sauce. Close the lid and continue cooking for another 15 minutes, until the sauce caramelizes on the ribs.
- 7. Remove the ribs and brush once more with the sauce before serving.

Kitchen Tip:

If a full-size smoker is not available, a wood-chip box holds the chips directly above a gas or charcoal fire as the heat releases their aroma. Make sure to soak the wood chips before adding to the fire; damp chips will smoke more than dry ones.

Grilled Pineapple with Cream

The banana is the classic sundae go to choice and a great source of potassium too, Pineapple, however, has the perfect matching of sweetness and acidity—which is only intensified when it's grilled and is further sweetened by the sweet cream. The touch of rum and the toasted coconut to this grilled pineapple is like having a piña colada on your plate. Light and refreshing.


NUTRITION: 290 calories, 11 g fat (7 g saturated), 35 g sugar SERVES 4

INGREDIENTS:

- 4 (1/2"-thick) slices fresh pineapple, core removed
- 1 Tbsp butter
- 2 Tbsp brown sugar
- 2 Tbsp dark rum
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 2 cups vanilla ice cream
- 2 Tbsp shredded sweetened coconut, toasted (Toasting the coconut is optional, but highly recommended. To toast, spread on a baking sheet and bake in a 350°F oven for 12 minutes, until golden brown.)

INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Heat a grill, grill pan, or large sauté




- 2. Cook the pineapple rings for 3 to 4 minutes per side, until caramelized all over.
- 3. Cook the butter, brown sugar, rum, and vanilla in a saucepan over low heat, stirring occasionally, until the sugar fully melts, and the sauce is a uniform dark brown. Keep warm.
- 4. Place one slice of pineapple on each of 4 small plates.
- 5. Top with a scoop of ice cream, drizzle

on the rum sauce, then finish with the toasted coconut.

Pineapples also have great unexpected health benefits as well:

- Anti-inflammatory benefits
- Goof for bone strength
- Immune system support
- Eye health, as well as lessening your risk of macular degeneration, which is an eye disease that can develop in people's eyes as they age.
- Reduces risk of blood clot
- Aids in digestion



INGREDIENTS:

- 2 apricots or peaches, halved and pitted
- 2 cups plain Greek-style yogurt (we like Fage 2%)
- 4 Tbsp chopped toasted walnuts (The easiest way to toast nuts is to roast them in a dry pan set over medium heat for about 5 minutes, stirring once or twice as they toast.)
- 4 Tbsp maple syrup (If you don't have real maple syrup, or live near a local farmer's market, you're better off with honey or agave syrup than Aunt Jemima.)

INSTRUCTIONS: Heat a grill, stovetop grill pan, or broiler until hot. Cook the fruit until nicely caramelized on the outside, about 5 minutes. The fruit should be softened but still maintain its shape. Top each fruit half with yogurt, walnuts, and maple syrup.

Simple Truths You Should Know

arriages are under fire, and vou don't have to look far or long to recognize that. This fire is destructive, and seeks to wreak havoc in the lives of many. You might ask, "Who is exempted or immune?". The simple answer is... no one. Divorce comes to professionals, the wealthy, the poor, celebrities, the young, the old, Christians, non-Christians, newlyweds and veteran couples. Executives have led prosperous businesses, presidents and prime ministers have built robust economies; and some pastors have established mega-churches, yet amongst their accolades lies the inability to find similar success in their marriages.

Is there a guarantee that your marriage will survive the epidemic of demise and failure affecting the institution of marriage? In this article, I have outlined guiding principles that if allowed to shape your perspective will take you to and through a lasting, enjoyable and fruitful marriage. Though I cannot capture everything that is required for a long-lasting marriage within the limits of these pages, I can share that if you adopt these principles and build your marriage on them, you will be driving your marriage on the road to success.

#1 Marriage Needs the Manufacturer's Manual

When manufacturers design an appliance, they provide instructions and a manual for

effective usage and maintenance. When we do not utilize that product according to the owner's manual, this can result in damage and loss. Marriage, much like your home appliances, has a creator and designer and that creator is God. God has provided us with His Manual (Scripture), His prescription and His Purpose for Marriage and if we are going to experience healthy and successful marriages, we have to live in God's way.

To try and discredit what I have said, many have said that the Bible has no examples of a perfect marriage or a model of the same. I would petition that those persons look again. The Bible portrays the relationship of Jesus Christ to the Church as the ultimate model that every marriage should seek to emulate (Ephesians 5: 22-33). When Christian marriages fail, it is not God who has failed, but us. We have to live our marriages God's way. The Bible is loaded with principles about finances, love, forgiveness, trust, children, sexual intimacy, unity and communication; all essential principles that can bring us marital peace and contentment. When we choose to live our marriage by our feelings, trendy patterns, ungodly standards, or man's opinion we are deviating from God's way. We must go to the scripture, see what the Designer of

#2 Marriage requires preparation

A sad indictment facing marriages is that we spend more time and money focusing on the ceremony rather than on the marriage. The ceremony lasts a few hours but the marriage is for a lifetime. Whether the ceremony is simple or elaborate, costly or cheap, beautiful or bland, some measure of preparation precedes a wedding ceremony. Before you say "I do" prepare yourself mentally. Recognize the serious commitment you are about to make. Marriage is for the mature. Are you ready to leave your single life? Do you know how to control your temper, how to love and care for someone, and how to communicate effectively? Are you ready to leave selfishness behind? because marriage is not about "me" it

Prepare yourself financially. Husbands, are you ready to assume the financial responsibility of providing for a family? Do you have a legal source of income to provide for the needs of your family Do you know where you will live

and how you will manage debt? What are your short and long-term, financial goals? If you don't have discipline in your spending, you can drive your family to poverty. This is why it is wise that before you get married, you invest in premarital, biblically-based counsel that gives you an accurate view of the expectations and obligations of marriage.

Prepare yourself emotionally. The scripture teaches that a man shall leave his father and his mother (Genesis 2:24). If you are not ready to cut strings with your maternal home, then do not try to establish your home. When you get married, you have to be prepared to prize your spouse before your parents. This is in no way suggesting that you neglect your family. This is just God's order for the unity that a new couple needs. #3 Marriage should be seen as Permanent




#4 Marriage requires Fidelity


12. The Gift of Celebration




